1.	WHAT LOFNAC-100 ARE, AND WHAT THEY ARE USED FOR
Di	clofenac sodium, the active ingredient in LOFNAC-100, is one of a group of medicines
cal	lled non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs (NSAIDs). NSAIDs reduce pain and
inf	lammation.
	LOFNAC-100 relieve pain, reduce swelling and ease inflammation in conditions
	affecting the joints, muscles and tendons including:
	☐ Rheumatoid arthritis, osteoarthritis, acute gout, ankylosing spondylitis
	☐ Backache, sprains and strains, soft tissue sports injuries, frozen shoulder, dislocations
	and fractures

### 2. THINGS TO CONSIDER BEFORE YOU START TO TAKE LOFNAC-100

Some people MUST NOT take LOFNAC-100. Talk to your doctor if:

You think you may be allergic to diclotenac sodium, aspirin, ibuprofen or any other NSAID.
or to any of the other ingredients of LOFNAC-100 . (These are listed at the end of the leaflet.)
Signs of a hypersensitivity reaction include swelling of the face and mouth (angioedema).
breathing problems, runny nose, skin rash or any other allergic type
reaction
You have now, or have ever had, a stomach (gastric) or duodenal (peptic) ulcer, or
bleeding in the digestive tract (this can include blood in vomit, bleeding when emptying
bowels, fresh blood in faeces or black, tarry faeces)
You have had stomach or bowel problems after you have taken other NSAIDs
You have severe heart, kidney or liver failure
If you have established heart disease and/or cerebrovascular disease e.g. if you have had
a heart attack, stroke, mini-stroke (TIA) or blockages to blood vessels to the heart or brain
or an operation to clear bypass blockages
If you have or have had problems with your blood circulation (peripheral arterial disease)
You are more than six months pregnant.

## You should also ask yourself these questions before taking LOFNAC-100:

- Do you suffer from any stomach or bowel disorders including ulcerative colitis or Crohn's disease?
- Do you have kidney or liver problems, or are you elderly?
- Do you have a condition called porphyria?
- Do you suffer from any blood or bleeding disorder? If you do, your doctor may ask you to go for regular check-ups while you are taking these tablets.
- Have you ever had asthma?
- Are you breast-feeding?
- Do you have angina, blood clots, high blood pressure, raised cholesterol or raised triglycerides?
- Do you have heart problems, or have you had a stroke, or do you think you might be at risk of these conditions (for example, if you have high blood pressure, diabetes or high cholesterol or are a smoker)?
- Do you have diabetes?
- Do you smoke?
- Do you have Lupus (SLE) or any similar condition?
- Do you have an inherited intolerance to some sugars such as lactose? (LOFNAC-100
  Tablets contain a small amount of lactose.)

If the answer to any of these questions is YES, discuss your treatment with your doctor or pharmacist because LOFNAC-100 might not be the right medicine for you.

# Are you taking other medicines?

	Are you pregnant or planning to become pregnant? Although not common, abnormalities						
	have been reported in babies whose mothers have taken NSAIDs during pregnancy. You						
	should not take LOFNAC-100 during the last 3 months of pregnancy as it may affect the						
	baby's circulation.

### Will there be any problems with driving or using machinery?

Very occasionally people have reported that LOFNAC-100 have made them feel dizzy, tired or sleepy. Problems with eyesight have also been reported. If you are affected in this way, you should not drive or operate machinery.

## Other special warnings

You should take the lowest dose of LOFNAC-100 for the shortest possible time,
particularly if you are underweight or elderly.
There is a small increased risk of heart attack or stroke when you are taking any medicine
like LOFNAC-100. The risk is higher if you are taking high doses for a long time. Always
follow the doctor's instructions on how much to take and how long to take it for.
Whilst you are taking these medicines your doctor may want to give you a check-up from
time to time.
If you have a history of stomach problems when you are taking NSAIDs, particularly if you
are elderly, you must tell your doctor straight away if you notice any unusual symptoms.
Because it is an anti-inflammatory medicine, LOFNAC-100 may reduce the symptoms of
infection, for example, headache and high temperature. If you feel unwell and need to
see a doctor, remember to tell him or her that you are taking LOFNAC-100.
The 100 mg tablets are not suitable for children aged under 12.

## 3. HOW TO TAKE LOFNAC-100

The doctor will tell you how many LOFNAC-100 to take and when to take them. Always follow his/her instructions carefully. The dose will be on the pharmacist's label. Check the label carefully. If you are not sure, ask your doctor or pharmacist. Keep taking your tablets for as long as you have been told, unless you have any problems. In that case, check with your doctor. Take the tablets before or with food.

Swallow the tablets whole with a drink of water. Do not crush or chew the tablets.

The usual doses are:

#### **Adults**

75 mg to 1100 mg daily divided into two or three doses.

The number of tablets which you take will depend on the strength the doctor has given you.

### **Elderly**

Your doctor may advise you to take a dose that is lower than the usual adult dose if you are elderly. Your doctor may also want to check closely that the LOFNAC-100 are not affecting your stomach.

### Children

Not recommended for children.

The doctor may also prescribe another drug to protect the stomach to be taken at the same time, particularly if you have had stomach problems before, or if you are elderly, or taking certain other drugs as well.

### What if you forget to take a dose?

If you forget to take a dose, take one as soon as you remember. If it is nearly time for your next dose, though, just take the next dose and forget about the one you missed. Do not double up on the next dose to make up for the one missed. Do not take more than 1100 mg (three 100 mg tablets) in 24 hours.

### What if you take too many tablets?

If you, or anyone else, accidentally takes too much, tell your doctor or your nearest hospital casualty department. Take your medicine pack with you so that people can see what you have taken.

### 4. POSSIBLE SIDE EFFECTS

LOFNAC-100 are suitable for most people, but, like all medicines, they can sometimes cause side effects. Side effects may be minimised by using the lowest effective dose for the shortest duration necessary.

Some side effects can be serious

Stop taking LOFNAC-100 and tell your doctor straight away if you notice:

☐ Stomach pain, indigestion, heartburn, wind, nausea (feeling sick) or vomiting (being sick)

	Any sign of bleeding in the stomach or intestine, for example, when emptying your bowels, blood in vomit or black, tarry faeces
	Allergic reactions which can include skin rash, itching, bruising, painful red areas, peeling
	or blistering
	Wheezing or shortness of breath (bronchospasm)
	Swollen face, lips, hands or fingers
	Yellowing of your skin or the whites of your eyes
	Persistent sore throat or high temperature
	An unexpected change in the amount of urine produced and/or its appearance.

If	you notice that you are bruising more easily than usual or have frequent sore throats or

	Stomach pain, heartburn, nausea, vomiting, diarrhoea, indigestion, wind, loss of appetite
	Headache, dizziness, vertigo
	Skin rash or spots
	Raised levels of liver enzymes in the blood.
Ra	are side effects (These may affect between 1 in every 1000 to 1 in every 10,000 patients):
	Stomach ulcers or bleeding (there have been very rare reported cases resulting in death,
	particularly in the elderly)
	Gastritis (inflammation, irritation or swelling of the stomach lining)
	Vomiting blood
	Diarrhoea with blood in it or bleeding from the back passage
	Black, tarry faeces or stools
	Drowsiness, tiredness
	Hypotension (low blood pressure, symptoms of which may include faintness, giddiness or
	light headedness)
	Skin rash and itching
	Fluid retention, symptoms of which include swollen ankles
	Liver function disorders, including hepatitis and jaundice.

	tinnitus (ringing in the ears), sleeplessness, nightmares, mood changes, depression, anxiety,
	mental disorders, disorientation and loss of memory, fits, headaches together with a dislike
	of bright lights, fever and a stiff neck, disturbances in sensation.
	Effects on the stomach and digestive system: Constipation, inflammation of the tongue,
	mouth ulcers, inflammation of the inside of the mouth or lips, taste changes, lower gut
	disorders (including inflammation of the colon, or worsening of ulcerative colitis or
	Crohn's disease).
	Effects on the heart, chest or blood: Palpitations (fast or irregular heart beat), chest pain,
	hypertension (high blood pressure), inflammation of blood vessels (vasculitis), inflammation
	of the lung (pneumonitis) heart disorders, including congestive heart failure or heart attack,
	blood disorders (including anaemia).
	Effects on the liver or kidneys: Kidney or severe liver disorders including liver failure,
	presence of blood or protein in the urine.
	Effects on skin or hair: Serious skin rashes including Stevens-Johnson syndrome and Lyell's
	syndrome and other skin rashes which may be made worse by exposure to sunlight. Hair
	loss.
	Other side effects that have also been reported include: Inflammation of the pancreas,
	impotence. Facial swelling, inflammation of the lining of the brain (meningitis), stroke,
	throat disorders, confusion, hallucinations, malaise (general feeling of discomfort),
	inflammation of the nerves of the eye.
Do	not be alarmed by this list - most people take LOFNAC-100 without any problems.
If a	any of the symptoms become troublesome, or if you notice anything else not mentioned here,

	If your doctor tells you to stop taking the tablets, please take any unused tablets back to
	your pharmacist to be destroyed. Do not throw them away with your normal household

# 6. FURTHER INFORMATION

The tablets contain 100 mg of the active ingredient, diclofenac sodium USP. The tablets are enteric coated.
